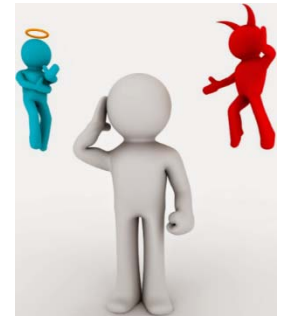

**ABSTRACT:** Did you know that engineers have almost as long an ethical code as doctors and attorneys? And all professional engineers must revisit ethics every year, before renewing their PE licenses. This seminar will address the common **ethics pitfalls** that face our graduate students, both in school and after graduation. We'll discuss **data collection** & description, data & **results fabrication**, paraphrasing vs. **plagiarism**, **author** responsibility, PE **licensing**, & ethics in **teaching**. We'll talk about how this applies to your current role, as students, and how it carries over into professional careers. We'll also address **your questions, thoughts, & ideas**.



**BIO:** UT Austin's Schoch Professor of Civil, Architectural and Environmental Engineering, Dr. Kockelman teaches classes in statistics, data acquisition & analysis, design of transportation systems, travel demand forecasting, & transport economics. She holds a PhD, MS, and BS in civil engineering, a Masters of City Planning, and a minor in economics from UC Berkeley. She has received a Google Research Award, NSF CAREER Award, MIT's *Technology Review* Top 100 Innovators award, and ASCE's Huber Research Prize, Bartholomew Award, and Laurie Prize. She is the author of over 140 archival journal articles, serves on several committees of the Transportation Research Board, and served as a Peace Corps Volunteer in Ecuador.
